Kent County Council gives almost 20,000 food vouchers to families to help feed children during half-term

Kent County Council has given almost 20,000 food vouchers to vulnerable families to help them feed their children during the half-term holiday.

KCC's scheme allowed parents and carers of eligible children to apply for one £15 voucher per child, which could be spent in either Asda or Tesco. The scheme ran between Monday, October 26 and Monday, November 2, and during that time KCC received and processed applications for 19,875 children who were eligible to receive Free School Meals.

In response to unprecedented challenges faced by domestic abuse services during the Covid-19 pandemic, KCC commissioned the Kent Integrated Domestic Abuse Service (KIDAS) partnership, which consists of Clarion Housing Group, Look Ahead, Oasis Domestic Abuse Service and Victim Support to create and launch *Domestic Abuse: It's Everybody's Business*, a suite of free virtual events aimed at businesses, community groups and individuals to educate, inform and inspire action across the county in a bid to ensure more victims are identified and can find safety quickly and easily.

Taking place from 25 November to 10 December 2020, the events will coincide with <u>the UN</u> <u>16 Days of Activism Against Gender-based Violence</u> campaign, and will enable attendees to know about, understand and act against this destructive social issue.

The pick and mix programme of 16 free online events can be accessed from anywhere, at times to suit varying schedules. From first introductions to professional development with CPD accreditation for social sector professionals, there is something for every knowledge level and expertise. Sessions are as short as 15 minutes and a maximum of 75 minutes

New regional adoption agency launches to recruit adopters for vulnerable children in the South East

A new regional adoption agency "Adoption Partnership South East" has launched with a focus on recruiting more new adopters across the South East and accelerating processes.

Adoption Partnership South East has been formed in response to a Government mandate that all local authorities must join a regional adoption agency by April 2020. It brings together knowledge and expertise from London Borough of Bexley, Kent County Council and Medway Council to help find loving parents and families for children with a wide range of profiles and needs waiting for their forever home.

The new partnership will provide prospective adopters across the South East region access to a larger number of children helping to find the right match quickly and speeding up processes.

KCC completes countywide £7.1 million resurfacing programme

Kent County Council has completed a countywide £7.1 million resurfacing programme to extend the life of around 720,000 square metres of Kent's roads.

Known as micro surfacing, the specialist treatment seals the surface of roads to preserve the structure and prevent potholes. The treatment can preserve a treated road for eight to 10 years and extends the time before more disruptive and extensive renewal works are required.

KCC opposes possible big increase in housing targets

KCC has responded in strong terms to government proposals for increased housing targets across Kent.

In a letter to the Secretary of State for Housing, Communities and Local Government, KCC Leader Roger Gough and Mike Whiting, the Cabinet Member for Economic Development, challenge the housing numbers for Kent and stress that providing the appropriate infrastructure must precede any major developments.

The letter has been sent to Mr Robert Jenrick in response to the government consultation on its proposals. KCC challenges plans to change the standard method for assessing housing numbers. It says even the most conservative figures highlight an overall increase of more than 30%. They include increases in the targets for new housing of 115% in Dover, 86% in Dartford and 71% in Tonbridge and Malling.

The overall annual requirement for Kent and Medway is already forecast to rise from 7,577 homes a year to 12,073 (a 60% increase) following the current standard method. The proposed changes would increase this by a further 2,835 to 14,908 homes a year.

KCC stresses that it supports the Government's growth ambitions and says the county has consistently delivered more new homes than other local authorities in the south east. Together with the county's district councils, it is also involved in discussions with the government about an "Infrastructure First" strategy. It also recognises the government's commitment to build 300,00 new homes a year.

However, it says the formula behind the new proposals penalises many of the areas across the county which have already delivered significant growth.
