## JTB 22/15 PROPOSED 40MPH SPEED LIMIT - B2016 SEVEN MILE LANE, MEREWORTH

The report of the Head of Transportation at Kent County Council detailed the proposed 40mph speed limit restrictions on the B2016 Seven Mile Lane, Mereworth. The Schemes, Planning and Delivery (SPD) Team were assisting with the writing and consultation of the traffic regulation order (TRO) for the scheme which was being funded and installed on behalf of Kent County Councillor Sarah Hudson via the Combined Members Grant (CMG). The report sought approval to proceed to make the Traffic Regulation Order following public consultation already completed.

**RESOLVED:** That the 40mph speed limit on the B2016, Seven Mile Lane, be implemented as shown on the plan at Appendix D to the report.

## JTB 22/16 UPPER HAYSDEN LANE, TONBRIDGE - PROPOSED TRAFFIC CALMING SCHEME AND GENERAL UPDATE

The report of the Head of Transportation, Kent County Council, outlined the outcomes of the public consultation in relation to the proposed traffic calming on Upper Haysden Lane outside The Nexus School and heading north east towards Brook Street. The report also referred to discussions and previous reports in relation to the request for a reduction in speed limit to 30mph on Upper Haysden Lane. It was highlighted that the complete scheme would include a 30mph speed limit, concrete cushions (traffic calming) and flashing (wig-wags) school warning signs in the vicinity of the school access.

**RESOLVED:** That the full scheme, as shown at Appendix A to the report, be installed.

## JTB 22/17 ON-STREET PARKING CHARGES - OUTCOME OF PUBLIC CONSULTATION

The joint report of the Director of Street Scene, Leisure and Technical Services and the Director of Finance and Transformation detailed the outcome of the public consultation in respect of on-street parking charges. Although the proposals had been advertised and objections invited, no responses were received to the proposals either in support or objection.

#### JTB 22/18 HIGHWAYS FORWARD WORKS PROGRAMME: 2022/23

The report of the Kent County Highways, Transportation and Waste summarised schemes programmed for delivery in 2022/23 and provided an update on Road, Footway and Cycleway Renewal and Preservation Schemes (Appendix A), Drainage Repairs and Improvements (Appendix B), Street Lighting (Appendix C), Transportation and Safety Schemes (Appendix D), Developer Funded Works (Appendix E), Bridge Works (Appendix F), Traffic Systems (Appendix G) and the Combined Members Grant (Appendix H). Representatives from Kent County Council Highways responded to questions relating to street lighting in the borough, footway protection on Sevenoaks Road/Borough Green

Road, signage and placement of safety cameras on Tonbridge Road, the enhancement of Ryarsh bus services and the flooding issue on Pembury Road.

A request was made that consideration be given to the responses received in respect of the A20 scheme between the A228 and Coldharbour if the scheme were revisited, and that the planned drainage remedial work be included in any new scheme.

#### 1 PARKING ACTION PLAN, PHASE 13

#### Summary

The Borough Council has for many years divided requests for new and revised parking restrictions into separate phases of the "Parking Action Plan".

This report covers the formal consultation stage of the parking restriction proposals contained in Phase 13 of the Parking Action Plan, and seeks approval to implement the changes.

It also considers the introduction of a permit parking zone and associated parking restrictions to the Shakespeare Road area of Tonbridge that was held over from Phase 12 of the Parking Action Plan in September 2021.

#### 1.1 Introduction

- 1.1.1 Following the September 2021 meeting of the Joint Transportation Board, investigations into proposed parking changes were undertaken at 33 sites across the Borough.
- 1.1.2 These proposals were then reported back to the March 2022 meeting of the Board, where it was decided that 23 locations should proceed to formal consultation and invitation of objections.

#### 1.2 Phase 13 - Informal Consultation

- 1.2.1 Formal consultation was carried out on the 23 locations from 8<sup>th</sup> July 2022 to 31<sup>st</sup> July 2022 and letters were sent directly to the frontagers affected, notices were placed on-street and in the local press, and documents were available on-deposit at TMBC and Kent County Council offices The details were also available on the Borough Council's website.
- 1.2.2 A list of all the locations, the issues raised and a recommendation for each is included in **Annex 1**.

- 1.2.3 **Annex 2** contains each location summary, with more detail as to the response rate, analysis and recommendation.
- 1.2.4 **Annex 3** contains plans of the Phase 13 proposals that were circulated as part of the consultation.
- 1.2.5 **Annex 4** contains the plan of the Shakespeare Road restrictions.
- 1.2.6 **Annexes 5-1 to 5-20** contains a redacted copy of all the consultation responses relating to the Phase 13 proposals that have been received within the consultation period.

#### 2 SHAKESPEARE ROAD, TONBRIDGE

- 2.1.1 The Shakespeare Road area of Tonbridge was considered for a permit parking area and new double yellow lines in Phase 12 of the Parking Action Plan.
- 2.1.2 The proposals proceeded through the consultation processes and were presented to the 20<sup>th</sup> September 2021 meeting of the Board for consideration.
- 2.1.3 At the September 2021 meeting, Cllr Hood asked that the proposals be held in abeyance as the proposals were based on the parking issues associated with the local college, and that the college's revised travel arrangements due to measures in place to address Covid-19 restrictions had yet to settle.
- 2.1.4 It was decided by the Board that implementation of the proposals for the Shakespeare Road area should be put on-hold for a full cycle of the Parking Action Plan, until the consideration of the formal consultation of the Phase 13 responses (this stage).
- 2.1.5 As the agreed period of abeyance has now past, the Shakespeare Road restrictions agreed at the September 2021 meeting should now be taken forward for implementation, along with the Phase 13 restrictions.
- 2.1.6 Plans of the agreed restrictions for the Shakespeare Road area are attached as ANNEX 4

#### 3 <u>LEGAL IMPLICATIONS</u>

3.1.1 The powers allowing the Borough Council to carry out parking management activity are contained in the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984, supplemented by formal agreement with Kent County Council as the Local Highway Authority, in respect of its powers under the Traffic Management Act 2004. In particular, Page 15 4 JTB - Part 1 Public 21 September 2020 section 122 of the Road Traffic Regulation 1984 Act imposes a general duty on local authorities exercising functions under the Act to secure the expeditious, convenient and safe movement of vehicular and other traffic (including pedestrians) and the provision of safe and adequate parking facilities on and off the highway.

- 3.1.2 The Borough Council carries out parking enforcement under an Agency agreement with Kent County Council by way of a Traffic Regulation Order, under the terms of the Road Traffic Act 1988 (and its amendments), the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 and the Traffic Management Act 2004.
- 3.1.3 Changes to parking charges are made via an Amendment Orders to the Council's on and off-street parking Traffic Regulation Orders, using the procedures set out in the Local Authorities' Traffic Orders (Procedure) (England and Wales) Regulations 1996 and will reflect any temporary amendments to procedures introduced to address Covid-19 restrictions. The proposals have followed and exceeded the requirements of the Local Authorities' Traffic Orders (Procedure) (England & Wales) Regulations 1996
- 3.1.4 The matters raised in this report are considered to be routine, uncontroversial or not legally complex.

#### 3.2 Financial and Value for Money Considerations

3.2.1 Funding for the development of the Parking Plan is provided within existing revenue budgets.

#### 3.3 Risk Assessment

- 3.3.1 The comprehensive assessment and consultation process applied to Parking Action Plans provides the assurance that the Borough Council has the will and ability to adapt proposals brought forward, in the light of comment and circumstances, and to ensure that it achieves a best balance of local parking needs. A regular review of the schemes is crucial to ensure that the Council correctly and effectively manages on-street parking in these areas, as the proposals are either introduced for safety reasons or to provide a more appropriate balance of parking needs.
- 3.3.2 A major risk is that scheme proposals encounter significant lack of local support. This risk is mitigated by the considerable effort devoted to ensuring there is widespread consultation on proposals both informally and formally.

Some commented that they did not want to pay for permit parking, but the introduction of a permit parking scheme has initial costs of physical works and ongoing maintenance and patrolling costs, and this is set against the charges for permits, which is the same across the Borough.

There was a concern that the proposals might displace parking to private parking spaces nearby – but this would be for the owners / managers of those private parking facilities to manage.

There were concerns raised from a local business that the restrictions would affect on-street parking for their staff, and requesting that their staff be allowed to apply for permits. However, the proposals are intended to provide more parking opportunities for residential parking rather than make provision for additional business parking.

In light of the responses, it is recommended that the Joint Transportation Board seek the views of the local Members for the area and either choose to abandon or implement the changes.

In light of this we are proposing the introduction of an additional 1pm-2pm restriction time - this is similar to permit bays currently operating effectively in Springwell Road and Woodfield Road. No changes to the layout of the bays are proposed at this time.

# Informal consultation

The Borough Council carried out informal consultation on the proposed parking restrictions, from 7<sup>th</sup> January to 30<sup>th</sup> January 2022.

As part of the informal consultation we wrote to 188 properties, asking residents for their views, and we received the following responses;

### Informal consultation responses

The response rate to the informal consultation was average for this sort of proposal, with the majority of respondents in favour of the proposed changes.

Looking at the distribution of the responses along the road, those at the southern end (away from the town) tended to object to the proposal, but those at the northern end (closer to the town and the commuter parking problem) were more in favour.

## Recommendation after informal consultation

In light of the positive nature of the responses, it is recommended that the Joint Transportation Board agree that the proposals should **proceed** to formal consultation.

## **Outcome from Joint Transportation Board**

At the 7th March 2022 meeting the Board considered the proposals and the informal consultation outcome and decided that the proposals should proceed to formal consultation and invitation of objections.

#### **Extension to proposals**

After the Board meeting on 7<sup>th</sup> March we received a further 2 requests for changes to parking restrictions in St Mary's Road – one was from a resident, for a very minor reduction to a parking bay to ease turning movements from a driveway, that should not reduce overall parking capacity, and the other was from TMBC's Waste Services team who were having recurring reports from their contractor about obstructive parking and difficulties or their refuse freighters to pass along the road. Concerns were also raised that if a refuse freighter

had difficulties, a fire appliance would similarly be challenged. The proposals were thus altered, with a loss of 3 parking spaces outside No.163 & 163a and the extension of double yellow lines to cover the same area.

#### Formal consultation

The Borough Council carried out informal consultation on the proposed parking restrictions, from 8<sup>th</sup> July to 31<sup>st</sup> July 2022.

As part of the formal consultation we wrote to nearby properties immediately affected by the proposals, asking frontagers for their views. We also placed notices on-street, in the local press and online. The proposals were also available on-deposit at Borough Council and KCC offices. We received the following responses;

## Formal consultation responses

The comments against the alteration of the parking bays tended to focus on the parking pressures in the area and that the reduction in parking would make things worse, but in a permit parking area parking has never been guaranteed in the road that you live, but space may well be available in roads nearby – and it is often the case that there is parking availability in neighbouring roads.

There has to be a balance between the wishes of those wanting not to lose convenient parking and those that want to have regular refuse collections and emergency vehicle access.

#### Recommendation

In light of the requirements to maintain access, it is recommended that the Members of the Board set aside the objections for both the time extension and the alteration to parking bays for large vehicle access, and that the proposed changes be introduced.

  opposing traffic flows would have better separation and is partly covered by a "no
  overtaking" centre white line,
- a likely increase vehicle speeds though this area is already partly covered by a 30mph speed limit,
- and that there would be displacement of parking to nearby residential areas Should
  this be the case then those areas (if part of the public highway) could be considered
  in a later phase of the Parking Action Plan.

It should be noted that the northern part of the proposed restrictions already has a white "no overtaking" centreline, and as such any parking alongside that line is prohibited and should not occur – but this is an offence that can only be enforced by Kent Police rather than a parking contravention (as proposed) that could be enforced by the Borough Council.

The existing white edge of carriageway marking that runs throughout was introduced by Kent County Council and is also not enforceable by the Borough Council and could be enforced as the offence of obstruction by Kent Police if they chose to do so. The Borough Council has had a number of calls about "obstructive parking in the cycle lanes" but unfortunately these are not cycle facilities and the Borough has no enforcement powers.

#### Recommendation

In light of the requirements of the Highway Code not to cause obstruction and the requirements not to park alongside the centre white line system, it is recommended that the Members of the Board set aside the objections and agree that the proposed changes be introduced.

I refer to your letter dated 8<sup>th</sup> July 2022 regarding the formal consultation about proposed new double yellow lines at the junctions of Lavender Close, Lavender Road and Carnation Crescent in East Malling (your reference Phase 13-Form-DD/591/10A), and wish to make the following response/observations.

We are in favour of double yellow lines being introduced at the junction of Lavender Road,
Lavender Close and Carnation Crescent but strongly oppose their introduction at the bottom of
Lavender Close from outside

No.16 to outside No.14. To our knowledge there
has never been an issue with parking on this part of Lavender Close but introducing double
yellow lines will create an issue as it will force the residents of Nos 15 and 14 to park their
vehicles elsewhere, putting strain on already limited on-street parking. It is worthy of note that
the introduction of double yellow lines within Lavender Close may indeed force residents to park
in other roads away from their address, requiring a change to their vehicle insurance policy
which may attract unwelcome additional expenditure during the cost of living crisis.

The junction of Lavender Road, Lavender Close and Carnation Crescent is a significant issue with parked vehicles often obscuring visibility, however for full effect, double yellow lines would also need to introduced from outside No.5 or <u>7 Carnation Crescent</u> to outside No.13, directly opposite the junction of Lavender Road. This would mean the entire junction is kept clear. It goes without saying however, that without effective enforcement, any new double yellow lines anywhere would be pointless waste of public finances.


I wish to further put on record my disappointment and dismay that **Kent Highways** (cc'd) have allegedly refused to re-instate junction markings on the junction of Lavender Road, Carnation Crescent and Lavender Close because (to quote a local councillor), "it was not considered a priority." These markings already exist but have faded over time; if one looks at the junction from different angles on Google Streetview, one can see the historic markings. It would merely take a small amount of white paint to re-instate the markings, far less than was used to rejuvenate those on the length of Chapman Way which happened this past week. It is apparent that Kent Highways would rather wait for an accident to occur and be compelled to act, than to exercise good judgement and seek to mitigate risk to road users through a simple and inexpensive maintenance task.

Finally I would also like to put on record the ongoing disappointment of many local residents that **Clarion Housing** (cc'd) — who own a large proportion of the properties and adjoining land in this area — continue to be next to useless with regards to assisting their tenants with off-street parking. I know of several who have been refused or have had to wade through much bureaucracy to have driveways created, and there are areas of dead ground which could be converted to residents' parking. For example, there is a large raised grass bank on Lavender Close between us at No.16 and our Clarion tenant neighbours at <u>1 Carnation Crescent</u>. This piece of ground is a wasted resource which costs Clarion to maintain, yet despite a great many

requests over many years by many people, Clarion continue to refuse to turn it into parking spaces. It is big enough for at least 5 vehicles which would go a long way to resolving parking issues and as a by-product road safety, in the area. Clarion's continuing stubbornness to support their tenants and lack of thought for the wider picture is both bemusing and frustrating.



#### Good morning,

I am writing with regards the formal consultation about proposed changes to parking bays in Mill Street & Middle Mill, East Malling.

As previously expressed, I am in favour of restricted parking along Mill Street and Middle Mill from Monday - Friday 8am - 6pm. I would like to see the purchase of residents permits restricted to residents of Mill Street (as highlightedin blue on the map enclosed in the consultation). I am heartened to see that Middle Mill is being considered in the parking arrangements as this is in my opinion necessary to provide the level of parking required for residents of Mill Street. This is particularly so given the conversion of the Rising Sun to 5 flats without allocated parking. When occupied these flats will undoubtedly provide greater strain on parking in the area where there is already limited parking for residents. The proposals will also limit parking in residential streets by employees of the Flight Centre. I appreciate that employees need to get to work, but they do have a large car park that is often under-utilised in favour of employees parking on Middle Mill. I would like to see the Flight Centre looking at options to encourage employees to take up schemes such as car sharing and taking public transport (trains) to work. I feel that this is in line with Employers encouraging more environmentally sounds ways of working, but also reflecting the reality that they have a business that is located in a rural village.

Whilst you had a low initial response to your informal consultation, I have had many conversations with residents in the area who would support a restricted parking arrangement. The responses against parking restriction may well have been because the initial proposal only recommended resident's parking bays along Mill Street and did not include Middle Mill. Resident's therefore felt that they would be paying a cost for the permit for insufficient spaces which would not change the situation from what we experience currently. This is why I hope residents will now support the proposal which includes Middle Mill.

I understand from Councillor's Ludlow and Beadle that the proposals for yellow lines on Bull Lane & Greenfield Close are being discussed at the Council Meeting on Tuesday.

There seems to a consensus among the Councillors and a vocal minority of villagers that it is acceptable to have vehicles parked dangerously contravening Rule 243 in the Highway Code for the following reasons:-

- Parking vehicles on the bend slows down through traffic, surely this should be tackled by traffic calming measures.
- There is not enough parking in the village, this surely is not the way to solve this problem, lack of parking will only get worse once the Trenport Development is given the go ahead and I think we should not delude ourselves if we think Trenport will solve this problem.

I hope that common sense prevails, and the Council support the proposals to allow the yellow lines to go ahead in the interest of the majority of villagers and road users who pass through our village.

Can I suggest that the council canvas the opinions of a more representative number of Villagers rather than appease the vocal minority or we will have a repeat of the Pedestrian Crossing situation and where the safety of the many was compromised by the few.

How are you going to police any parking on the double yellow lines? Would it not be more economical to put a white line in front of the crossover into properties 15 to 18 The Croft rather than double yellow lines. This would be clear then to everyone to keep the area clear.



This diagram is what you are proposing. The yellow lines will look out of place. Would it not be more economical to put a white line across the pebbled access road to the cul de sac for properties 15 to 18.

White line here instead of the proposed double yellow lines across the access road to the properties 15 to 18.

We do feel that this whole process is unfair, and we have taken the matter further by writing to our MP.

We sincerely oppose this proposal as it is unfair when we have not caused any obstructions and this consultation, and the previous consultation has not been carried out fairly. In addition to this, by putting the yellow lines down, this will mean residents will have to use their front gardens for additional parking and this will not be good for the environment and will detract from the beauty of the area and will make it look more like a London suburb.

### Dear Sir or Madam,

I am writing to reiterate my objection to the plans to create additional double yellow line parking restrictions at the sites indicated.

It is a proposed solution for a problem that does not exist and therefore a waste of the council's extremely stretched budget. I have lived in the road for 10 years and can count on one hand situations where there have been issues with people parking obstructively other than for a very brief period (e.g. a delivery or very brief visit). The photograph (submitted to the earlier consultation) of the Land Rover vehicle obstructing the driveway between numbers 19 and 21 is wholly unrepresentative of parking in the street. There is already a dropped curb at that location so parking there is already contrary to the rules of the highway code. I presume that photo was taken during a very brief visit or drop-off.

In addition, I note a couple of residents calling for residents' parking in the street. These residents are claiming that non-residents parking in the street causes a shortage of spaces for residents' use. However, the real issue is the fact that there are approximately 24 parking spaces in the street and about 30 households. Some of the houses are flats/multiple occupancy properties, and at least 10 households own more than one car. One resident (in one of the flats) owns two cars and a large van. Another household has a van and two cars. Several households have two cars and as far as I know, no households have no car. The idea of allotted parking bays per household is completely preposterous and unworkable. We have been consulted on this on numerous occasions over the past decade and most residents have objected.

Regarding the above formal consultation I would be grateful if you could consider the following points against the proposal:

- The double yellow lines have recently been extended at the junction. Notwithstanding the
  requirement for the junction end to follow standard highway design criteria for junction
  protection, I am not aware of any instances where the current arrangements have
  compromised either safety or ease of access. The fact that waste collection services are
  able to access the road without issue bears this out.
- 2. To further extend the double yellow lines at the junction would reduce already oversubscribed parking capacity in the street, forcing more residents, many of who are elderly or who have young children, to park elsewhere on often busy roads (the lack of a crossing point on the Shipbourne Road and the failure to enforce the 20mph speed limit along this road only serve to increase hazard).

### Further points to consider:

- Further reducing parking capacity on Ashburnham Road should prompt a further proposal to introduce a resident permit parking scheme.



We are **not in favour** of the proposed parking restrictions on Chiltern Way and Cheviot Close.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment; our points are as follows:

- 1. We do not see the need for parking restrictions as there does not currently appear to be a problem that warrants such measures; nothing has changed since this was raised in October 2015.
- 2. Any problems that relate to parking on a bend, or near a junction, on the pavement or on a dangerous or obstructive position are already covered by Rules 242, 243 and 244 of the Highway Code. Simple enforcement of the code would solve any potential problems.
- 3. Imposing double yellow lines would be grossly disproportionate to any parking issues, in fact the more restrictions imposed the greater the problems as parking space becomes even more constrained causing problems for both motorists and residents and also discourages adherence to the 20mph zone as the clearer the roads the faster motorists drive and this route is already a potential 'rat run' from the Shipbourne Road to Yardley Park Road.
- 4. We consider the argument for the safety nature of these proposals to be unconvincing. Coping with unnecessary, unslightly parking restrictions all day long is not something that will enhance this neighbourhood and rather than improve safety it has the potential to exacerbate parking and speeding problems.

Dear Sir, in response to your letter of 8 July, I write to give you our response to the proposed extension of double yellow lines into Cheviot Close from Chiltern Way in Tonbridge (DD/591/19A)

We believe that the addition of lines on the tight curve on the West side of the junction would be of benefit as this is potentially dangerous when cars park there. The extension of new lines along the East side of Chiltern way would reinforce current practice of parking only being available on the West side. 





A bus stop clearway allows for a bus to stop at that location and prevents loading, unloading and disabled blue badge parking.

A bus stop can also be enacted as a bus stand, allowing buses to remain at that location for longer, so bus drivers can then leave their vehicle for toilet breaks etc.

A TRO is not technically required to create a bus stop clearway or a bus stand, as these are catered for under primary legislation, but ought to change the TRO to remove the double yellow lines that run through the bus stop, to prevent the loading / unloading.

This bus stop is frequently used as part of the rail replacement services when there are issues with train services and there have also been complaints from bus companies about the lack of accessible facilities for drivers to be able to take comfort breaks.



The number of parking spaces in St Mary's Road is already limited in relation to the number of residents and their vehicles, and so reducing the parking bay outside 163 & 163a by 3 cars would cause a lot more issues. Reducing by 3 cars for the ease of the refuse collectors is very drastic, as most large lorries are able to navigate the bend in the road.



In response to proposed changes to parking restrictions, we offer up our comments in this respect:

Firstly, we agree to parking bay amendments outside the highlighted properties as we have observed refuse collectors in the past on occasion, having to rock a car nearer to the kerb to gain through access.

Secondly, we again make the point that due to a number of the properties being of a rental nature, it is often the case that there is a lot of movement of tenants and the requirement of trades people needing access.

Should afternoon restrictions be put in place this would cause not only further stress for the occupiers but also the labourers who would have to try to find another parking space, which may be very inconvenient all round. Also, with the cost of living crisis as it is there will undoubtedly be householders who will struggle to afford an extra parking permit for visitors.

Thirdly, it is understood that the majority of householders agreed to afternoon restrictions in the northern end of the road and those at the southern end objected. We are of the opinion that St Mary's Road could have the suggested changes up to the junction with Springwell Road from Pembury Road, but beyond that to the top of St Mary's Road should remain as it is at present.

I do not object to the additional hours restriction in the afternoon as I believe this will help residents who live at the bottom of the road.

I strongly object to the loss of three parking places from 163/163a St Marys Road as requested by the refuse collectors. There have been occasional issues with the refuse collectors knocking on doors to ask residents to move their vehicles. However this has been on a Saturday when the refuse has failed to be collected during the week. On a Saturday morning more residents are at home as opposed to a working day, hence the issue with additional parked cars.

Removing three parking places will have a permanent impact on the available parking on the road, and this is unfair to residents and not an appropriate resolution to the issue.

Regarding your proposals to change permit parking bay restriction times, I support these changes. You have noted that the in the distribution of responses to your consultation, those at the southern end (away from the town) tended to object to the proposal, but those at the northern end (closer to the town and the commuter parking problem) were more in favour. This may be because a large number of odd numbered houses in the southern end have off road parking and/or garages and would not be affected by any proposed changes. Those at the northern end do not. Perhaps the Council should take this into account when reviewing any results of parking consultations.

Regarding the calls for some minor changes to parking bays, I note that the parking bay outside number 107 is to be reduced to prevent obstructive parking of nearby access, and new double lines are to put across this access. I cannot fully support this proposal.

The council reduced the double yellow lines at the northern end of St. Mary's Road to enable more parking bays to be available; you are now proposing to reduce these again effectively losing one parking space. Those of us commenting on the original plans to build the properties behind number 107 highlighted the problems with the access experienced by the businesses that had previously been located at the site. It doesn't appear that vehicles are being parked to deliberately obstruct the access, only to the restrictions of the parking bays. It therefore seems excessive to reduce the bay by such a large amount.

If the Council is to reduce this parking bay so drastically, are they also able to insist that the occupants of the properties requiring access then park all of their vehicles, including large business vans, off the road? This may then enable other residents without the luxury of off road facilities to park within the vicinity of their own residence - perhaps even actually in the same road.





#### Dear Sir / Madam

I am writing in relation to the consultation you are currently running about proposed changes to onroad parking spaces on St. Mary's Road, Tonbridge TN9. I am sorry that I cannot find the paperwork you sent through and so do not have the reference number to hand.

One of the proposals is to get rid of 3 on-road parking spaces, outside a bank of houses towards the top of the road on the right hand side. (I think the number is 164 or thereabouts). This is on the bend of the road. The spaces would be replaced by double yellow lines. The reason listed in the paperwork is that the refuse collectors have complained that there people park inconsiderately, and there is insufficient room to move the refuse lorry on collection day.

I appreciate that the road is narrow, and that the refuse lorry has a hard time getting to the top of the road. However, removing three parking spaces and permanently replacing them with yellow lines would be a completely disproportionate response that would unfairly penalise local residents who mostly do not have driveways on this stretch of road. The refuse lorry only comes to the road once a week, for a few minutes at a time. Residents need to park on the road every day. Removing three parking spaces on a permanent basis would mean we literally have nowhere to put our cars. This is particularly difficult in the evenings. If we return to the house in the evening, all the spaces are full and we have to drive several streets away. There simply isn't enough spare space to justify this proposal where are ordinary residents meant to park their cars?

Perhaps one alternative solution could be to require residents to move their cars specifically from those three spaces on the days that the lorry is driving by to do the collection? This would surely be more sensible.

I would urge you please to think again as you consider next steps for parking on this road.

#### **Matters For Decision**

#### 1 PARKING UPDATE

#### **Summary**

The Borough Council has for many years divided requests for changes to parking restrictions into separate Phases of the "Parking Action Plan", or for wider areas as discrete "Parking Reviews".

This report covers the content of the next Phase (Phase 14) of the Action Plan, and an update on the Borough's parking reviews

#### 1.1 Phase 14

- 1.1.1 A list of location requests recommended for consideration in Phase 14 of the Parking Action Plan is shown in **Annex 1**.
- 1.1.2 Members will note that the list includes 32 locations, which is considered to be the maximum number of schemes that can be addressed within the available staff resources with the Parking team.

#### 1.2 Future Phases

- 1.2.1 A further list of 95 requests is shown in **Annex 2** which will be held on a 'holding list' for consideration in future phases of the Plan.
- 1.2.2 **Annex 3** shows a list of a further 5 sites where we have received requests for review. However ,these sites have been identified as already been delivered, been resolved by other authorities, part of a parking review area, are no longer be required or unsuitable on the public highway.

#### 1.3 Current Procedure

- 1.3.1 The current procedure for requesting and progressing changes to parking restrictions is as follows:-
  - Request received and added to waiting list.
  - Sites collated into manageable phases

- Approval for the next phase reported to Joint Transportation Board with recommendation to move to informal consultation.
- Report to Joint Transportation Board on the outcome of informal consultation with recommendation to alter/adjust proposals if appropriate and to move to formal consultation.
- Report to Joint Transportation Board following formal consultation with recommendations to approve/abandon proposals.
- Install approved schemes.
- Review of impact of proposals after 12 months if required.

#### 1.4 Phase 14 Consultation

- 1.4.1 Subject to Member approval it is proposed that locations and proposals recommended for consideration in **Annex 1** should now be taken forward for investigation and then to informal consultation.
- 1.4.2 The response to the informal consultation will be reported back to a future meeting of this Board.

#### 2 PARKING REVIEWS

- 2.1.1 In addition to the Phased Parking Action Plans, the Borough Council has agreed a programme of Parking Reviews, where more complex issues or packages of measures can be addressed.
- 2.1.2 There are currently three Parking Reviews under way, Kings Hill, Hadlow and Hildenborough, with a future review programmed for Snodland.
- 2.1.3 The delivery of the Borough's parking reviews has been severely affected by the Covid-19 pandemic, not only has it impinged on the Council's ability to carry out reviews, but there has also been a significant variation in day-to-day parking habits as there has been a shift to more home working and less travel to work.
- 2.1.4 The parking issues in Kings Hill cover a number of locations across the development, with a variety of issues relating to the style of the development and the number of adopted and private roads.
- 2.1.5 The Council has taken proposals through informal consultation and formal consultation. However, local Members have asked that the review be placed onhold to allow additional locations to be bought forward.
- 2.1.6 The Council has also been developing proposals for parking restrictions across Hadlow (and Golden Green) ready for informal consultation in the next few

- months. Once again it is the intention to report the outcome of this consultation to a future meeting of this Board.
- 2.1.7 Proposals are still in development for Hildenborough. The issues are complex due to competing demands for residential, business, commuter and school parking. These have been significantly affected by the change of commuter habits and will be re-visited once more normal traffic patterns establish themselves.
- 2.1.8 Hildenborough Parish Council have reviewed the initial proposals and their comments are being considered and some elements of the proposals may require re-assessment.
- 2.1.9 Officers will continue to develop the proposals for Hildenborough, ready for informal consultation in the next few months.

#### 2.2 Legal Implications

2.2.1 The on-street parking service is undertaken by the Borough Council on behalf of Kent County Council under the terms of a formal legal agreement.

#### 2.3 Financial and Value for Money Considerations

2.3.1 Funding to implement works associated with the Parking Action Plans and the Parking Reviews exists within the Borough Council's revenue budgets.

#### 2.4 Equality Impact Assessment

2.4.1 The decisions recommended through this paper have a remote or low relevance to the substance of the Equality Act. There is no perceived impact on end users.

#### 2.5 Recommendations

#### It is **RECOMMENDED** that -

1.the Board agree the locations listed for Phase 14 of the Parking Action Plan shown in Annex 1,and

2.the holding list of requests shown at Annex2 be held for future consideration in future phases of the Parking Action Plan

## 1 PARKING ACTION PLAN, ACCESS GROUP 7

## Summary

This report covers the formal consultation on proposals in Access Group 7 – subset of the Parking Action Plan where the Council has applied a streamlined process for the consideration and promotion of minor changes to the Traffic Regulation Order.

## 1.1 Access Group 7 – locations

- 1.2.2 A summary of the consultation responses are as follows:

- 1.2.3 In line with the Council's procedure, those locations where no objections were received (Meridian Place, East Malling and 57 The Drive, Tonbridge) can be implemented and are reported to this Board as an information only item.
- 1.2.4 The proposal for 40 Lionel Road, Tonbridge received less than 5 objections therefore the objection was shared with the local County and Borough Members along with the Chair of this Board to seek their agreement to either set aside the objection or to refer the objection to this Board for consideration.
- 1.2.5 On this occasion as it has not been possible to obtain a consensus from the Chair and local members for this location, this is now a matter for this Board to consider.
- 1.2.6 The remaining locations all received 5 or more objections, therefore these cannot be considered by Local Cllrs and JTB Chair, but instead must be reported for consideration by this Board.
- 1.2.7 A list of all the locations, the issues raised and a recommendation for each is included in Annex 1.
- 1.2.8 Annex 2 contains each location summary, with more detail as to the response rate, analysis and recommendation.
- 1.2.9 Annex 3 contains plans of the Access Group 7 proposals that were circulated as part of the consultation.
- 1.2.10 Annex 4 contains redacted copy of all the consultation responses relating to the Access Group 7 proposals that have been received within the consultation period.

## 2 **LEGAL IMPLICATIONS**

- 2.1.1 The proposals have followed and exceeded the requirements of the Local Authorities' Traffic Order (Procedure) (England & Wales) Regulations 1996.
- 2.1.2 The matters raised in this report are considered to be routine, uncontroversial or not legally complex and a legal opinion has not been sought on these proposals.

## 2.2 Financial and Value for Money Considersations

2.2.1 Funding to implement works associated with the Parking Action Plan Access Group 7 is provided within existing revenue budgets.

#### 2.3 Risk Assessment

- 2.3.1 The assessment and consultation process applied to parking management should provide assurance that the Borough Council has a will and ability to adapt the Parking Plans, in the light of comment and circumstances, and to ensure that it achieves a best balance of local parking needs. A regular review of the schemes is crucial to ensure that we correctly and effectively manage on-street parking in these areas as the proposals are introduced for safety reasons or to provide a more appropriate balance of parking needs.
- 2.3.2 A major risk is that scheme proposals encounter significant lack of support. This risk is mitigated by the considerable effort devoted to ensuring there is widespread consultation on proposals. There is also care given to ensuring that proposals are adjusted and adapted in light of comments and observations received from the local community, without compromising safety or the Council's commitment to deal appropriately with identified safety concerns.

## 2.4 Equality Impact Assessment

2.4.1 The decisions recommended through this paper have a remote or low relevance to the substance of the Equality Act. There is no perceived impact on end users.

## 2.5 Recommendations

It is **RECOMMENDED** that the recommendations for each location in Access Group 7 shown in Annex 1 be adopted , and where appropriate the proposals be implemented.

As part of the consultation we wrote directly to 30 properties, placed notices on street and in the local press, placed the proposals "on deposit" at the Council Offices (Tonbridge Castle and Kings Hill), the Kent County Council Offices, Sessions House, County Hall and on the Council's website. We also contacted the normal Statutory Consultees (local Councillors, Emergency Services, bus companies and other interested road groups).

The responses to the formal consultation were as follows;

#### **Analysis**

The objections received are from residents who raise concerns regarding the loss of onstreet parking provision close to their address. However, even though Douglas Road is part of a wider resident parking zone, parking close to your address cannot be guaranteed, and indeed is not a right in any regard. The alteration to the existing parking bays is necessary in order to accommodate the proposed new vehicle crossover which has been approved by KCC in their role as the Highway Authority.

#### **Streamlined TRO process**

Under the agreed streamlined process for consideration of minor amendments to parking restrictions, minor amendments that attract 5 or more objections cannot be considered by the Chair of JTB and the local Borough and County members for the area, therefore this matter is now for the Board to consider the objections and decide whether to implement the proposals or not.

Recommendation to the September 2022 meeting of the Joint Transportation Board. It is recommended that the views expressed during the formal consultation are noted.

However, the changes to the parking restrictions are necessary to reflect the legal right of access that was established when Kent County Council gave permission for the access. The decision to allow an access is normally covered under "permitted development" rights, administered through KCC as the Highway Authority, or (in conservation areas) through the formal planning application process. The decisions from the planning or the permitted development processes are not part of this procedure, and the changes to the parking arrangements are necessary to accommodate those permissions or rights. There is little scope for the Borough Council to take any action but to facilitate the decisions already made.

Legally we are required to carry out the statutory consultation process, and consider objections received, but the Board are advised that the change is necessary to support the change to the Highway that the Highway Authority has already agreed.

Accordingly it is recommended that the Board note that alterations to the existing permissions are not within the gift of the Joint Transportation Board, and with permissions already granted, **set aside** the objections and the proposals for the changes to parking arrangements be implemented to accommodate the new access.

However, the removal of the existing parking bay is necessary to reflect the Kent County Council condition of planning consent. There is little scope for the Borough Council to take any action but to facilitate this decision already made. The construction of No 123 is now complete and its occupation will follow once the legalities of its purchase are concluded.

The associated proposal to relocate the parking bay has triggered safety concerns from residents who maintain that the parking bay should remain in its existing location. However, this is not possible for the reason given above.

The one objection was received by a resident of Lionel Road who raised concerns regarding the following points:

the loss an existing Highway tree; KCC as Highway Authority have approved the installation of a new dropped kerb which will require the removal of an existing Highway tree to safely accommodate the new dropped kerb. KCC are planning replacement plantings of 2 x Tilia cordata 'greenspire', one of which will be situated outside No 40 with allowances made for the new vehicle access, and the second outside No 38. Planting and future care of these new trees will be overseen and managed by KCC's Soft Landscaping Team. These works will be paid for by the applicant.

- potential damage to existing drainage covers within the curtilage of the applicants private land; the applicant has taken engineering advice and does not consider there to be a problem.
- the loss of on-street parking: even though parking on Lionel Road is part of a wider resident parking zone, parking close to your address (or indeed any space) cannot be guaranteed. The alteration to the existing parking bays is necessary in order to accommodate a new vehicle crossover which has already been approved by KCC in their role as the Highway Authority.

## **Streamlined TRO process**

Under the agreed streamlined process for consideration of minor amendments to parking restrictions, minor amendments that attract less than 5 objections can be considered by the Chair of JTB and the local Borough and County members for the area, and if of a consensus, the objections can be set aside and the proposals implemented, with the matter reported as information to the next meeting of the Board.

This proposal and the objections were reported for consideration by the Chair and the relevant local Members on the 1<sup>st</sup> September. As there was no consensus from the Chair and local members, it is for the Board to consider.

Recommendation to the September 2022 meeting of the Joint Transportation Board. It is recommended that the views expressed during the formal consultation are noted.

However, the changes to the parking restrictions are necessary to reflect the legal right of access that was established when Kent County Council gave permission for the access. The decision to allow an access is normally covered under "permitted development" rights, administered through KCC as the Highway Authority, or (in conservation areas) through the formal planning application process. The decisions from the planning or the permitted development processes are not part of this procedure, and the changes to the parking arrangements are necessary to accommodate those permissions or rights. There is little scope for the Borough Council to take any action but to facilitate the decisions already made.

Legally we are required to carry out the statutory consultation process, and consider objections received, but the Board are advised that the change is necessary to support the change to the Highway that the Highway Authority has already agreed.

Regarding the consultation to he proposal for double yellow lines, we would like to draw your attention to a number of points below:



No. 40 faintly proposed that a new tree would be planted further down the road, but this will take many years to reach the proportions of the existing tree. Secondly, we would like to know where the tree would be planted to avoid a long space between the current trees to keep the existing view in proportion? Would it be a sapling, would there be a cage put around it to protect it? Who will

pay for this and when would it be done?
We see from the photos, in the planning application last year and the photos attached here, there are two drains just inside the property, could these be damaged by the weight of a heavy vehicle continually parking on top? 

Thank you for consulting us on the proposal to remove a parking bay outside no.78 Judd Road to accommodate an extension to the drop kerb. We wish to **object** to the proposal.

We would note that the off-road parking space to no.78 is already accessible via the dropped kerb to their driveway. This arrangement has been in place and worked for a number of years. The loss of the parking space is therefore unnecessary and the owners are clearly able to move in and out of the space perfectly well.

Moreover, its loss will be to the detriment of other residents on Judd Road. The space is in a location where many dwellings, particularly on the east side of Judd Road, do not have any off-road parking. There is significant pressure on parking spaces in this location during the evenings and weekends in particular. This pressure has been increasing in recent months and we have more regularly needed to park some distance from our home and, at times, on double yellow lines at the top of the road - as do others, because there is no other reasonable choice. You may not have surveyed the parking in the evenings but it is a problem more often than not and of course the Council does not actively limit the number of parking permits issued to residents.

The space in question is well used and its loss will have a considerable impact on other residents' ability to park. We have noticed the impact of a loss of an individual space, for example, when skips have been placed on the road.

We therefore do not consider it appropriate to allow the loss of this space to marginally improve the access of one household to their off-road space (which can already be accessed), at the detriment of all the households that rely on on-street parking.

We also consider it creates an unhelpful precedent for other properties in the vicinity to follow suit.

On this basis, we would ask that this proposal is rejected.

## DD/596/06 123 Woodside Road Tonbridge

### Dear TMBC Parking,

I'm writing to object to the proposals for changes to the on-street parking arrangements for 123 Woodside Road. In this tricky location the idea was a good one in theory, but in practice we are at risk of making things worse.

The plans for the new building pre-supposed a necessity to move parking from the lefthand (northern) to the righthand (southern) side of the road. But now the building is in place it seems to me to be unnecessary.

I suggest that a decision be deferred for, say, six months, until the building has been occupied and any possible issues have been identified.

Besides being unnecessary I think it's liable to be unworkable.

As you can see from my pictures, in the current circumstance there is heaps of space to park on the drive of the new building. The parked car is no more of an obstruction than the lamp post or the dwarf wall.

In my view - and I live here so I know - moving the space is liable to be a mistake. Having a car parked opposite may actually make things MORE difficult for the new residents, not less, as it will increase the angle they would need to turn in. See my attached sketch Doc101.jpg.

And I think we can all guess what would happen when they came to reverse out again with a car parked opposite?

That means they'd have to go forward and reverse back onto their drive. So now you've got traffic coming into the road, with the right hand side blocked, and in the remaining space, a vehicle reversing into the oncoming traffic that's not expecting them.

I'm pretty sure that if the building was already occupied, and you asked the new residents what they would prefer, they'd say, 'keep it as it is'. Another reason to defer the decision.

Leaving aside the position of the new owners of 123, the move will increase, not decrease, the likelihood of accidents in general.

I live opposite and my home office overlooks the street: scarcely a day goes by without me hearing the meep-meep noise of an HGV having to back out. The attached video shows one you might recognise. (Low rez so I can email it to you.)

You can see the problem, I'm sure. Delivery vans and cars routinely halt on the left hand of the road: this is predictable and seems reasonable enough.

(There is, after all, nowhere else for Ocado, Sainsburys, pizza men and

so forth to halt briefly while they deliver; they would certainly not be better parking on the right hand side of the road.)

If the driver of an HGV is going to have to slalom between cars parked on \*both\* sides of the street, that will be challenging enough.

But when he gets to the junction with Quarry Hill, he is going to issue forth, backwards, ON THE LEFT HAND SIDE of the road. Incoming drivers may just conceivably be expecting someone to come at them going the wrong way: what they're not expecting is someone coming out the wrong way, backwards - AND ON THE WRONG SIDE OF THE ROAD.

It helps if there are two men in the cab, and one of them can jump out and signal from the main road. But that's not always the case: several times I've had to go out and help a single driver back out into fast traffic coming up Quarry Hill.

(You will remember that the 20mph limit on this road was recently removed: I predicted that traffic would revert to 40, 50 or even 60mph. Empirically I can tell you that that is exactly what has happened.)

And it's not just HGVs. There are occasions when the lower part of Woodside Road is blocked - ambulances, deliveries, dustmen, removal lorries - and residents do sometimes leave Woodside Road from the top end.

It's no good saying they shouldn't: the fact is that in the real world they do.

And in practice it works fine: as long as people coming in to the road are aware of the possibility they can tuck in to what is for them the left hand side of the road, and all is well.

But again: nobody expects traffic to come at them on the wrong side of the road. We will have accidents.

"A decision to adjourn is always in order." So I repeat: please let's delay a decision on this until practical circumstances tell us that the solution is actually going to be better than the problem.

If in a few weeks or months it becomes clear that things are not working, then the decision can be made in the light of real experience. In these circumstances, with the decision based on the real world, not theory, I would have no objection.

But at present we are guessing, and we may be guessing wrong.












Current scenario – parking space on the north side of Woodside Road

# **Summary:**

This report gives details of proposed Double Yellow Line waiting restrictions on Oldbury Lane and Old Lane Ightham, in Tonbridge and Malling. The Highway Improvements Team (HIT) are assisting with the writing and consultation of the traffic regulation order (TRO) for this scheme which is being funded and supported by the County Member Harry Rayner. This report seeks approval to proceed to make the Traffic Regulation Order following public consultation already completed.


# For Decision

# 1.0 Introduction and Background


1.1 Oldbury Lane is a quiet, narrow country lane with several residential properties, it provides a through route to the Local Primary School (Ightham Primary School) which is located centrally between Spring Lane and Sevenoaks Road. The lane ends at Manor Farm and is a no through route which is used by both cars and agricultural vehicles. It is a derestricted road with no street lighting. The recreational ground is situated nearby which is used by the local Football, Tennis scout groups and village events. The lane is narrow, tree lined with high banked verges without passing places.

Old Lane junction with the A25 Sevenoaks Road is also a very narrow single-track road, lined with trees and a high banked verge without passing places. There are few properties, the lane is a through route from Sevenoaks Road to Common Road with advisory signs advising that the route is unsuitable for motor vehicles. Old Lane is a narrow single track country lane with a derestricted speed limit. It is situated towards the end of the deceleration lane on the exit from the A25 Sevenoaks Road. The entrance to Old Lane from Sevenoaks Road is approximately 2m in width and 25m in length. There are no crossing points for pedestrians locally. The speed limit on the A25 is 50mph, making it an unsuitable location for pedestrians to park and exit vehicles.

The satellite image below shows the location of Old Lane and nearby locality.

- 1.2These proposed parking restrictions were discussed during a site visit on 1<sup>st</sup> December 2021 with the Local KCC Member Harry Raynor and representatives of Ightham Parish Council. Officers were asked to investigate measures to reduce inconsiderate parking on these 2 roads. The proposed restrictions aim to allow for passing of vehicles including agricultural vehicles on Oldbury Lane and reduce the danger to vehicles exiting and entering Old Lane by better managing inconsiderate/dangerous parking at the junction with the A25.
- 1.3 The proposed waiting restrictions on Oldbury Lane will enable farm traffic and delivery vehicles to pass the narrow section of carriageway reducing risk to private property. Officers have been made aware of various occasions where private vehicles and front garden fences have been damage by vehicles struggling to pass on the lane.

Parking restrictions on Old Lane junction with the A25 aim to relieve the impact of peak time parking and congestion on the A25 layby as it would maintain the necessary visibility when exiting this junction. These restrictions will also reduce risk of conflict to pedestrians when trying to cross at this point. Many pupils and parents/guardians cross at this location to reach Ightham Primary School and the recreation park.

# 2.0 Consultation

- 2.1 The County Council advertised its intention to implement the new waiting restrictions from the 27<sup>th</sup> May 2022 to the 20<sup>th</sup> June 2022 and the order was advertised as shown in **Appendix A.**
- 2.2 Notices were placed on the public highway outside the school and on the A25 Sevenoaks Road outlining the proposals, additionally an advert was placed in the *Kent Messenger* on 20<sup>th</sup> May 2022.
- 2.3 Various statutory consultees were contacted directly about the proposals including Kent Police, South East Coast Ambulance Service, Kent Fire and Rescue Service, The Road Haulage Association and The Freight Transport Association;
- 2.4The local County Council members and Tunbridge and Malling Borough Council ward members were also issued a copy of the consultation notice.
- 2.5 The closing date for the consultation responses was on the 20<sup>th</sup> June 2022, the County Council had received written support from Kent Police. We received 23 responses in objection from members of the public, and 6 responses in support of the proposals. A summary of the comments from the Borough and Parish Councils are included in **Appendix B**.
- 2.6 The most common reason for objection was in relation to increased speeds that may occur on Oldbury Lane through the removal of on-street parking, parking can act as a form of traffic calming and some respondents were keen for the parking to remain for this reason. Many of the objectors were concerned the proposed restrictions would be 24/7 double yellow lines, respondents to the consultation

- highlighted that there is a perceived lack of parking locally and this proposal would exacerbate the issue.
- 2.7 Following a thorough review of the objectors' comments a response was produced providing more detail about the purpose of the proposed restrictions, suggested amendments, and answers to some of the questions which had been raised. A copy of this response to the objectors can be viewed in **Appendix C**.
- 2.8 Most of the objections raised were in relation to the proposed restrictions on Oldbury Lane, and most respondents appear to support the proposed restrictions on Old Lane at the junction with the A25. For this reason the review included a retraction of the proposed Double Yellow Lines on Oldbury Lane leaving just the Old Lane parking restrictions to be introduced.

# 3.0 Discussion and Councillor comments

- 3.1 The consultation has not identified any safety or operational issues with the proposed double yellow lines on Old Lane.
- 3.2 There is clearly local need and support following approval of the revised waiting restrictions from the local Member and Kent Police.
- 3.3 This is a deliverable scheme that has the support of the Parish Council, for the parking restrictions on Old Lane. Officers and elected officials have taken on board comments from residents and the public and revised the proposals by removing the restrictions on Oldbury Lane from the scheme. The amended scheme proposals should assist in improving safety on and around the A25 Junction with Old Lane by protecting access visibility at the junction, the restrictions will also reduce congestion and enhance pedestrian safety. It is requested that the proposed double yellow line waiting restrictions be agreed and the TRO made.

# 4.0 Recommendation

4.1 It is recommended that the Traffic Regulation Order (TRO) for double yellow lines be implemented on Old Lane only, as shown in the plan in appendix D.

# **Appendix B – Consultation Responses**

Object	I object to the DYL in Oldbury Lane as they are not as requested
Object	There is very, very limited parking for residents here already. Parents have to sometimes park down the road and carry their children/ luggage.  The double yellow would also be on the widest part of the road so we struggle to understand why is it needed
Object	I have lived here for over 20 years and there has never been an issue, so I do not understand why a change is now needed. I have canvassed opinion of my neighbours and the majority object.  This restriction will directly impact 4 immediate neighbours 3 of whom I know are adamantly opposed to such parking restrictions and would prefer a more flexible and reasonable approach to parking in the area that we have managed for over 20 years
	The Irony is also that by opening up the lane by having no parked cars will increase speed of vehicles making the chances of an accident more likely and increasing the safety problem rather than reducing it. Parked cars act as a natural calming to help reduce speed in the lane, particularly at the corner concerned. In fact in the past, particularly when the children were younger I have actively parked in the lane rather than on my drive to help reduce the speed of cars passing by my front door.
	Local drives of the houses immediately impacted can only accommodate a maximum 2 cars so where is it suggested visitors park without a knock-on effect to other neighbours where parking is already limited in the immediate vicinity. The loss of what is ultimately 3 parking spaces will increase parking around other, narrower access points around the neighbourhood and further reduce safety. It is unreasonable and unrealistic to assume short term visitors will park in the recreation car park.
	Finally I fail to see the need to spoil our beautiful countryside with unsightly yellow markings.
Object	Unnecessary
Object	It will completely restrict parking in that area, which is needed by house owners for guests and have a knock on effect up and down the road.

Object	I strongly object on the grounds that although there has been some inconsiderate parking in the past, it will remain a safer and more flexible environment for us all without the yellow lines. The loss of these spaces will have a knock on effect to immediate neighbours at the junction of Spring Lane and Oldbury Lane as parking will become less available, furthermore I strongly believe that parked cars provide a natural calming measure for some of the inconsiderate speeding that happens in the lane.  It will push parking further up the lane towards Manor Farm where large vehicles need 24 hour access 7 days/week.
Object	Yellow lines near the oldbury lane/spring lane junction would simply create more problems for residents in both oldbury lane and the top of spring lane and would create more road safely issues and blockages in the lane. They would not benefit anyone except one resident who is only very occaisionally affected by school parents parking outside her drive, (which she can still get out anyway). It would be detrimental and less safe to all of us in nearby oldbury cottages and spring lane.
Object	Oldbury Lane does not need yellow lines. I've lived here since 1986 with children from 0-33 yrs old. We walked to school without fear of traffic. This is a lovely semi rural area and yellow lines are not in keeping with the quaintness of the area. Additionally, this will impact the parking in the local area. Parking is already at a maximum around the corner locally to this section so surrounding neighbours may be forced to park elsewhere than their usual spot should those who are affected by yellow lines need park somewhere else causing a further knock on effect. Besides, having cars already parked at said location can act as a speed reduction measure. Chatting locally, this is not a popular decision and driven by an exceptionally small minority. Just one I think. Thank you.
Object	Unnecessary. Insufficient parking currently. 1 resident removed the hedge against advice, 1lorry damaged her picket fence and now she only wants yellow lines
Object	Parked cars on the identified area slow traffic down on Oldbury lane. Making it safer for those walking. Both residents and visitors use this space for parking. The yellow lines on A25 outside lghtham rec have not made any difference during peak hours. 1 residents incident should not be used for draconian parking restrictions
Object	AONB therefore unsightly and cars parked there act as natural calming to traffic in the lane.  Utter waste of scarce local money too.
Object	The line proposed on Oldbury Lane are completely unnecessary and will be unsightly in the country lane. The only cars that park here are local residents and the spaces are needed. This corner is dangerous with traffic speeding up and down the lane, cars parked here help to slow the traffic.

## Object Couple of things here: 1 - why were the residents not consulted about this in advance of the notice going up? 2 - the road has remained unchanged for many years (I've been a resident for 10 years), so why is now a reason to introduce this? Parking is limited around the area as it is. Object Oldbury Lane - where would residents park if these spaces go? Yellow lines would simply move parked cars elsewhere, creating a different concern and putting more pressure on other residents in the area. The presence of cars here also serves to slow the traffic and discourage large vehicles from using the lane. Old Road - I don't object to this proposal, I think parking in this area is dangerous and unnecessary, but have no direct experience of the traffic flow here. Object No need for yellow lines in Oldbury Lane some there may be a car parked but not very often Object The proposed yellow lines banning parking of vehicles 30 metres from Oldbury Cottages in the easterly direction will RAISE THE LEVEL OF RISKS OF TRAFIC ACCIDENTS, involving vehicles, but, most importantly, for village school students, children and young people in the village, pets and pedestrians for the following reasons: 1) the sight of parked cars on Oldbury Lane has compelled all kinds of moving vehicles - from farm trucks and delivery bans to out-of-the-village visitors to residents - to invariably slow down while the space left still allows for a smooth flow of village traffice, albeit at a slower space (like 10-15 mph); 2). the T-intersection of Oldbury Lane and Spring Lane has a seriously blind spot for vehicles either turning right from Spring Lane on to Oldbury Lane in the easterly direction from Oldbury Cottages, or turning left on to Spring Lane. In this connection, the sight of cars parked next to Oldbury Cottages on Oldbury Lane, as well as the ones parked on Oldbury Lane in the easterly direction from that T-Intersection serves as a sign for cars coming from all 3-directions to SLOW DOWN and PAY ATTENTION. As a resident in the village over the last 7 years I have seen delivery trucks and out-of-village guests speeding up until they see the cars parked on Oldbury Lane. I have also seen young village kids learning to bicycle, teenagers and elderly folk walking with their dogs on lead, village moms and dads walking their school-aged children to Ightham Primary School, in mornings and afternoons. The safety of village residents - particularly less-safety-conscious children and vulnerable and frail elderly people trying to do their daily exercices - walks on Oldbury Lane and Spring Lane - should be of paramount important in the consideration of any new road regulations. The village as a whole have NOT had any troubles with the existing No-Yellow-Lines on Oldbury Lane, and the overwhelming majority of residents, both those who have private parking spaces and those without have been fully cooperative and considerate in terms of parking on the village lane. Please do NOT fix the road situation that is fully functioning, communally accepted.

Object	i object only and specifically to the Oldbury Lane proposal which I do not believe is necessary to create the safest, most flexible environment for the residents. Parking is limited on this road and whilst from time to time inconsiderate parking takes place I do not believe that painting yellow lines will be a constructive holistic solution to the traffic problems faced on Oldbury Lane. One detrimental outcome could be an increase in speed of traffic flow which on a school lane would be an unwelcome additional hazard.
Object	I object to the double yellow lines on oldbury lane. The residents have always parked considerately and I feel it would force them to park elsewhere causing more of a problem for everyone else.
Object	Too often yellow lines are imposed on neighbourhoods without fair consideration of the livelihood of residents, or the availability of parking spaces and my feeling is that this is the situation in this case. Although there has been some inconsiderate parking, which is not unique to that spot on the street only, it will remain safer and more flexible environment for the community without the yellow lines.
	Most of the time there is no parking space available around my house and introducing the double yellow lines will compound that problem. Instead of introducing more restrictions, we should think of how to provide appropriate and safe parking space for the residents.
	Additionally, the introduction of the yellow lines will potentially increase the number of speeding vehicles, making the lane unsafe. Having cars parked at the lane serves to make it safer and quieter, which can only be a good thing. Restricting parking as proposed will not only reduce parking options for local residents, it will effectively widen the lane leading to an increase in average traffic speed, making the lane noisier, and less safe for local residents, cyclists and pedestrians.
	Please, do not introduce further parking restrictions at Oldbury lane.

#### Object

Parking is already restricted in this area. Any further restrictions from this site, were the road is sufficiently wide to enable to safe passage of vehicles, will cause congestion and possible danger to vehicles and pedestrians elsewhere. Any visitors or tradesmen visiting the properties opposite the proposed lines will be forces to park elswhere further adding to congestuon and potential danger to all road users. A lot of pedestrans use this road as Ightham Priary school is located a little furtherdown the lane. Cars parked in narrower sections of the lane would put them at risk. A much more needeed easure would be to intorduce a speed limit of no more than 20mph. Furthermore, how would any restrictions imposed with yellow lines be enforced? Is TMBC going to employ a traffic warden at added cost to the public at a time when budgets are already stretched. I am sure that the cost of th eintallation of the lines in themselves would have some financial impact anyway.

I might also add that Oldbury is in an area of outstanding natural beauty, so that the appearance of yellow lines would greatly detract from this. We live in the country, not the town. There is no place for yellow lines in a rural lane.

#### Object

The proposal to introduce double-yellow lines has been put forward without any prior consultation with the residents of Oldbury or appropriate factual investigation of the situation. This section of Oldbury Lane is, in fact, the wdest part of the lane and introducing parking restrictions here will cause safety issues with parking potentially elsewhere.

At this section of Oldbury Lane, there are currently no safety issues for pedestrians or vehicles (and to my knowledge neither has there been in over 30 years whilst a resident). Residents, who might need to do so, always park with consideration for their neighbours - as do any visitors or, if required, a tradesperson short-term. With respect, the reasons provided by Kent Highways sadly do not reflect why the situation has even arisen - purely an objection by ONE individual resident, with off-road parking for multiple vehicles and whose driveway is always kept clear, who resents seeing any parked vehicle nearby and has distorted the issue to the Parish Council. Sometimes someone might need to park, as there is very little off-road parking in Oldbury Lane and not everybody has off-road parking - not everybody is able to find a parking space at the bottom of an unlit lane and walk up the lane in the dark. Nobody takes anybody else's parking space and nobody abuses the parking situation.

Spending time on this Traffic Regulation Order is a complete waste of KCC's valuable resources - Considering introducing double-yellow lines here is totally ridiculous.

Object	I would like to object to the proposed yellow lines in Oldbury lane. Not all local residents have driveways and have to park on the lane. There is still room for passing vehicles. Also Oldbury lane has the national speed limit driving restriction and I believe having parked cars on the lane slows down the traffic especially the traffic approaching the Spring Lane turning which is a blind corner.
Object	Introducing double yellow lines to Oldbury Lane will mean there are even fewer places for residents to park cars thus increasing pressure on the limited amount of on road parking that is currently available at the top of Oldbury Lane and Spring Lake near where they meet. The section of road proposed for double yellow lines is vital for parking for local residents.

## **Appendix C – Response to Objectors**

Dear Sir/Madam,

Thank you for your email regarding the proposed parking restrictions on A25/Old Lane and Oldbury Lane, Ightham.

Whenever we receive responses to parking restrictions and traffic regulation orders (TRO's) the first stage of the process is to contact each of the respondents. The period for consultation responses for this TRO closed on 20<sup>th</sup> June 2022, and you were listed as providing comments and a response to the consultation.


These restrictions were requested on behalf of Ightham Parish Council and your Local Member as a safety measure due to concerns with farm vehicles accessing the roads and parking issues during school peak times. However, following a review of the comments from the formal consultation KCC agree that the proposed DYL are inflexible for local residents. #### 1. Introduction

This report provides an update and summarises schemes that have been programmed for delivery in 2021/22 and 2022/23.

Kent County Council has recently published a forward works programme for the next five years covering planned maintenance of our highway assets. It is in two parts: the first concerns the next two years (2021/22 - 2022/23), and most of the sites included have already been verified by our engineers. The second part relates to years three to five of our five-year programme (2023/24 - 2025/26), and is largely based on data from our asset management systems, so may be subject to more changes as the schemes are verified.

This programme is subject to regular review and may change for a number of reasons including budget allocation, contract rate changes, and to reflect our changing priorities. The programme and extent of individual sites within the programme may also be revised following engineering assessment during the design phase, and additional sites may be added or others advanced if their condition deteriorates rapidly so that we need to react in order to keep the highway in a safe and serviceable condition.
