Hallsfield Road

Residents have asked that the existing single yellow line restrictions that deter commuters be removed and be replaced with a residents parking scheme.

With this in mind we are proposing the introduction of such a scheme. It should be noted that resident permit parking schemes incur new costs on residents who wish to park on the road. Accordingly we are asking those in the local area for their views.

Robin Hood Lane

Comments

I agree that some restrictions would be appropriate subject to the following observations:

The road between the recreation space access and Fostington Way junction is often busy partly because there appears to be some car related commercial activity around numbers 152/154. The small cul de sac next to the junction is always full during the day probably partly commuter related. It often overflows to the main road.

Additionally the road between the recreation space access and my cul de sac (I live at RHL) is generally pretty empty. In fact I seldom see any cars on the south side of the road and I travel along it 3 or 4 times a day.

My main concern is about any displacement following any further restrictions introduced. My cul de sac always has at least as many cars parked in it as the stretch of road under consideration even though most of the houses next to me have ample off road parking.

Parking is on both sides of the road and often partly on the pavement making access very difficult at times. Diverted short term visitors would have to find an alternative and that would be the cul de sac where I live. I accept the need for some restrictions in the cul de sac turning circle next to the footbridge but fear that this reduction in parking space would have serious consequences for all the houses here.

This will need to be addressed or the problem will be simply transferred from one place to another.

Comments

As a resident on the road in question I object to the proposal for Robin Hood Lane, as I believe it covers too wide a stretch of the road and is largely unnecessary.

As far as we are aware, from living on the road for over 10 years, the problem points for parking are:

- 1. At the junction with Fostington Way where cars are sometimes parked too close to the junction and cars tend to come round the corner at high speed (as the speed limit drops from 40mph just before it).
- 2. The cul-de-sacs at the top and bottom of this section of the road where parked vehicles do sometimes appear to obstruct residents' driveways.

However, the real issue with the road is not any on-road parking (which is often necessary for many residents themselves, their visitors and deliveries etc.), but rather the speed at which other people drive up and down the road. Many times I have had difficulties getting off my driveway safely, due to the excessive speed of vehicles travelling on the road around the bend. It is also unsafe for my children to cross the road themselves, for example, when they walk to and from school. It is also a particular issue at rush hour when many people speed up the road, using it as a "rat run" to avoid the traffic on Fostington Way.

In our experience, our neighbours and their guests generally park with consideration and try not to obstruct anyone else's driveways nor any other drivers using the road.

I will again re-iterate that it is the speed of vehicles travelling on this section of road that is the most pressing issue. Indeed, this very problem has been raised previously with TMBC by residents of the road, with no action/measures ever taken to try to reduce the speed of traffic here. My question is why should the residents of this stretch of road be penalised because others want to use it as a "rat run"?

I would urge you to reconsider these proposals, perhaps with the exception of the part near the junctions and the cul-de-sacs (if those residents believe there to be an issue). Please instead consider more appropriate measures to reduce the speed of drivers using this stretch of road, as this will have a much more positive impact for residents, including my children, than any parking restrictions will have. Thank you.


With reference to the above planned parking restrictions in Robinhood Lane (Lower), I strongly object to the councils proposed plan to install double yellow lines from the junction of Taddington Wood to Fostington Way for the following reasons:

- The reasons for the proposal are obstructive parking on bends and obstructed driveways in the Cul-de-sac but the real reason is that a family in the road continually have 8-10 cars on their drive and parked out on the street during the day and all night. Why don't you just speak to those individuals and stop them running what seems to be a car sales business from home? There are not normally cars parked further up on the bends which is where I live and if you drive down at any time of the day there are no issues.
- By installing double yellow lines you are just opening up the road allowing more people to speed through knowing that there won't be any obstructions adding to what is an already a dangerous road for pedestrians and other road users. Many years ago there was a speed survey completed and the fastest car sped down the road at 77MPH! When the council was approached, the response was that randomly parked cars in the road would slow these speeding drivers as they were natural obstructions legally parked. The council also refused to consider speed humps or closing the road from either end closing what is a 'Rat Run' to the Walderslade Woods road.

Given that some sort of restriction will undoubtably happen, I would propose the following:

- Double yellow lines installed in the cul-de-sac to prevent obstructive parking and reinstate the turning circle. This will also allow access to the fire hydrant in the road that is normally restricted.
- Double yellow lines installed at the junction and on the bends where the road meets Fostington Way and including the bus stop. This will prevent the commuters parking all day on the kerbs and verges that is unsightly and often dangerous for pedestrians and other road users.
- The remainder or Robin Hood Lane to have Monday-Friday restrictions with a single yellow line and different times either side similar to the part of Robin Hood lane where the crematorium is. Typically no parking from 11.00-12.00 on one side and then 12.00-13.00 on the other.

Please accept my thanks for reading this email and hope that it goes someway to making a better informed decision.



I would like to make the following points:

- The proposal to introduce double yellow lines along the whole of Robin Hood Lane between Taddington Wood and Fostington is excessive if the problem is on the bends and around the end of the cul-de-sac.
- If nothing is allowed to park except for dropping off and deliveries, then the road will become a race track. It is already used as a cut through to the Bridgewood Roundabout. Speed along the road will increase as there will be nothing to slow vehicles down. This is extremely dangerous for pedestrians crossing the road. Many people use our road to walk to Bluebell Hill and into Taddington Wood families with children, some in pushchairs, and older relatives; joggers; walkers; postal workers and so on. We have often struggled to cross in time when a fast car has rocketed around the top bend and down the road.
- Most of us have already paved or concreted at least part of our drives to enable off-road parking for families and friends as well as ourselves. But if this proposal goes ahead there will be an added environmental danger residents will be forced to 'soil seal' the whole of their drives. The 'dip' in our road already floods regularly it will definitely get worse if we are forced to cover the green parts of our gardens that are still left. The wildlife will suffer too.
- The best solution as far as I can see would be to repeat what you did in Tunbury Avenue from Fostington to Tunbury School. There is a parking restriction for one hour in the day each side of the road eg 12-1pm on one side; 1-2pm on the other. This system works really well. There is no commuter parking.
- I don't understand why this restriction is proposed to be 24/7? If the problem is during the daytime why extend it to overnight? I honestly don't understand why this is being proposed.

Dear Sirs,

Thank you for the opportunity to provide consultation feedback on these proposals.

I am very much opposed to the current proposals applying to the whole length of road, which seems disproportionate and excessive for the situation.

While it may (though not certainly) be necessary to introduce some restrictions around the footbridge turning area and/or the Fostington Way junction, I do not think restrictions are needed along the rest of the road.

This is a residential area, where most residents are car users. Although most properties have driveways (and these are used), cars parked on the road are to be expected – for visitors, carers, tradespeople etc. With a complete ban on roadside parking – where will visitors be expected to leave their cars? This is a practical question which needs to be answered.

Although I know that the road is used as a "rush hour rat run" when there are queues around the Fostington Way/Walderslade Woods road area, for most of the day (more than 20 hours) Robin Hood Lane is a very quiet road, so there really is no need for a 24 hour/7 day parking restriction.

In nearby Tunbury Avenue there is a single yellow line restriction for a staggered one-hour period each day on each side of the road – which is very effective in preventing all-day commuter parking. This should be considered for Robin Hood Lane, if any restrictions at all are deemed to be necessary.

There is generally very good visibility along the road. The presence of parked cars in the road acts as a natural traffic calming measure, requiring drivers to maintain concentration and moderate their speed.

If the road were cleared of these "obstructions" I fear the road would become more of a "race track" and encourage more use as a rat run throughout the day - by non-residents, potentially paying less attention to the speed limit and residential considerations. This would make the road more dangerous for cars entering and leaving driveways, and pedestrians crossing the road. Many pedestrians (including school children, dog walkers and the elderly) use the road for walking to and from Bluebell Hill and Taddington Valley.

While it may be possible (though not necessarily affordable) for some residents to expand their driveways to accommodate additional parking, this would lead to more "soil sealing" and rainwater run-off issues. After heavy rain there is already frequent flooding of the "dip" near the entrance to Taddington Valley (between properties 156 and 160). This

situation would only be worsened.

For all of the above reasons I am NOT in favour of the Borough Council's proposals.



We who live in the cul-de-sac in Robin Hood Lane need the double yellow lines to continue down the cul-de-sac. The reason is that at present we have vehicles parking both sides of the road. Some vehicles park overnight. The vehicles that now park on the houses side (our house side) park up on the pavement which is a hazard to pedestrians, pushchair users and disability scooters. With the new parking restrictions in Robin Hood Lane and the entrance to the cul-de-sac this will encourage more vehicles to park outside our properties causing more congestion and obstruction. We already regularly have difficulty getting out of the cul-de-sac as it is a narrow road. Also you are not including the cul de sac for the houses from 137-127.


This will mean that car owners will simply leave their cars there instead ,all day , opposite peoples drives and up on the kerb on the grass and either side of peoples drives.





Figs 1 & 2 show the planned disposition of double yellow lines proposed by TMBC – it can be seen that the proposed parking restrictions stop at the very entrance to the cul-de-sac where house Nos 136, 138, 144 and 142 stand.

The proposals DO NOT GO FAR ENOUGH. They should at the very least include all the high-kerb stretches on the side of the cul-de-sac where the houses are situated. That would effectively prevent vehicles parking on both sides of the very narrow cul-de-sac where cars currently regularly park on the pavement in front of the houses. My personal preference would be that restricted parking be imposed along the entire cul-de-sac on both sides.


HOWEVER, I appreciate that this is probably not practical – or at least not expedient. Nevertheless, stopping the restrictions just beyond the apex of the entrance to the cul-de-sac will simply increase the number of cars parked on the pavement and in front of the houses themselves.

Not to extend the yellow lines – at least down the kerb on the side of the houses AND provide for a turning area at the end of the cul-de-sac – will be to show complete disregard and contempt for the homes and quality of life for the residents of the cul-de-sac.

In Figures 4 and 4a, I have shown in yellow/orange the proposal put forward my TMBC. I have added in red what I consider to be the minimum acceptable extension of the parking restrictions (and I am sure the other residents would agree). These changes would ensure ingress and egress for residents together with public and emergency service vehicles while still providing some public car parking amenities.





Please find attached a Powerpoint presentation containing the response form provided by TMBC together with my detailed response and recommendations.

While the attached presentation includes photos and diagrams (Figures 1 – 4a) supporting my response, the essence of the text is as follows

Figs 1 & 2 show the planned disposition of double yellow lines proposed by TMBC – it can be seen that the proposed parking restrictions stop at the very entrance to the cul-de-sac where house Nos 136, 138, 144 and 142 stand.

The proposals DO NOT GO FAR ENOUGH. They should at the very least include all the high-kerb stretches on the side of the cul-de-sac where the houses are situated. That would effectively prevent vehicles parking on both sides of the very narrow cul-de-sac where cars currently regularly park on the pavement in front of the houses. IN ADDITION, no-parking lines should be put at the closed end of the cul-de-sac and for one car's length down the opposite side to ensure that there is an adequate turning space at the end of the cul-de-sac. Presently vehicles that need to turn around not only use the pavement but also use the private driveways of the houses—

In Figures 4 and 4a, I have shown in yellow/orange the proposal put forward my TMBC. I have added in red what I consider to be the minimum acceptable extension of the parking

restrictions (and I am sure the other residents would agree). These changes would ensure ingress and egress for residents together with public and emergency service vehicles while still providing some public car parking amenities.

Figure 3a shows my proposal overlaid on the aerial photograph of the cul-de-sac.

I trust that your consultation process will pay heed to and act upon my comments and those of other residents – who I know share my views – and that as a result TMBC will modify the current proposals accordingly.

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

Further to the below, I just wanted to provide a typical example to support my case. This was the situation yesterday (during the day at 13:30, and then in the evening when I tried to leave at 18:00).

It was impossible to make the right turn to exit my property due to the vehicle on the dropped kerb next to my drive and the van opposite. Since the road is a cul-de-sac, turning left is a dead-end.

It also makes it impossible for pedestrians to remain on the pavement.

Additionally my neighbours are all quite elderly, they often require ambulances or support vehicles (shopping deliveries etc.) which are unable to gain access safely.

There is also no way a fire engine could fit through that gap if I struggled with a small car.

Please can something be done about this at the same time, it's actually getting worse.
